1. [Adamson Trust](#) - voluntary organisations and charities, holidays or respite breaks for disabled children (aged 3 to 17 years) with physical, mental, or emotional impairments.
2. [Bailey Thomas Charitable Fund](#) - UK voluntary organisations and charities to assist with the care and relief of those affected by learning disability.
3. [Barchester Healthcare Foundation](#) - small local UK charities to improve the quality of life for older people, as well as adults with a physical or mental disability.
4. [Boost Charitable Trust](#) - small grants for UK charities and non-profit making organisations to help disabled and disadvantaged people participate in sport.
5. [Bruce Wake Charitable Trust](#) - leisure activities for the disabled in the UK.
6. [Birkdale Trust for Hearing Impaired](#) - to advance the education and welfare of children and young people in the UK that have a hearing impairment.
7. [Children Today Charitable Trust](#) - disabilities under 25, up to £1,000 for equipment, such as wheelchairs, walking aids, trikes, educational toys, communication aids, lifting and posturepaedic sleep equipment and sensory equipment like fibre optic sprays.
8. [CLA Charitable Trust](#) - for organisations in England and Wales to provide facilities for the disabled to take part in country sports and recreation.
9. [Clothworkers Foundation](#) - UK registered charities, CICs, and other registered UK not-for-profit organisations (including special schools).
10. [Christopher Laing Foundation](#) - small number of grants for charities that support children and young people, and social welfare and health, with a priority for disabled adults and organisations in Hertfordshire and Oxfordshire.
11. [Cotton Trust UK](#) - registered charities undertaking projects or items of specialist equipment, and occasionally for itemised running costs, for the relief of suffering, elimination or control of disease, or assisting people with disabilities and disadvantaged people of all ages.

12. **David Solomons Charitable Trust** - registered UK charities providing services or other benefits for people with learning disabilities.
13. **Day Trippers Foundation** - recreational and educational day trips for groups of children and young people (aged 5-25 years) who have disabilities or life-limiting conditions in the UK.
14. **De Brye Charitable Trust** - charitable organisations that provide care and housing for the aged, orphans and neglected children or aid physically disabled children and the blind.
15. **Disabled Facilities Grants**- financial assistance for adaptation works to disabled people's homes in England, Wales and Northern Ireland.
16. **DM Thomas Foundation for Young People** - Central Grants - UK registered charities for projects which focus on children and young people with disabilities, who are sick in hospital or who are life limited.
17. **Disabled Facilities Grants** - for individuals.
18. **Dorothy Hay-Bolton Charitable Trust** - charitable organisations, people with sensory disabilities in the UK.
19. **Dounglas Arter Foundation** - UK registered charities for the benefit of people of all ages with physical and mental disabilities.
20. **Doyly Carte Charitable Trust** - music and art therapy to improve the quality of life for the elderly and the disabled. Alleviating the suffering of adults and children with medical conditions who have difficulty finding support through traditional sources.
21. **Edgar E Lawley Foundation**\_ - smaller charities in the West Midlands for the old, young and disabled.
22. **Edgar Lee Foundation** – UK charitable organisations, particularly Dorset, undertaking social welfare activities, particularly involving children or disability.
23. **Edward Gosling Foundation** - people of all ages living on low incomes who have a physical and/or mental disability or long-term illness.
24. **Emerton-Christie Charity** - registered charities throughout the UK, including education and disability.
25. **Eveson Charitable Trust (West Midlands)** - UK registered charities working in the West Midlands - physical disabilities, learning difficulties, children who are disadvantaged or disabled, older people, homeless, hospitals, hospices.
26. **Family Fund Trust**\_ - families, or groups applying on their behalf, in the UK who are raising a disabled or seriously ill child or young person aged 17 years or younger.
27. **Fidelity UK Foundation** - London, Kent or Surrey. Health, including disability, palliative care and centres of excellence involved in ground-breaking research and treatments to address chronic illness (with a particular focus on investment in specialist equipment).
28. **Football Foundation - Grow The Game**\_ - to support the growth of new Female and Disability teams; grants of £1.5k.
29. **Graham Kirkham Foundation** - charitable organisations for UK projects, including young people and those with disabilities.

30. **Grocers' Charity - Memorial Grants** - small UK registered charities for the relief of youth poverty, the disabled, elderly, medicine, military, and the arts and heritage.
31. **Inman Charity** - UK registered charities for medical, social welfare or general welfare activities, particularly hospices, Armed Forces, medical research, older people and the disabled.
32. **Hadrian Trust (North East England)** - social welfare and charitable organisations working to improve the lives of people in the North East of England. Our main donations are in the fields of social welfare, youth, disability, the elderly, women, ethnic minorities, education, arts and the environment.
33. **Happy Days Children's Charity** - families with children aged 3-17 who are disabled, have a special need or have been abused in the UK.
34. **Headley Trust** - small grants providing practical aids to disabled people.

39. **Lionel Wigram Memorial Trust** - UK charities providing services for blind, deaf and disabled people.
40. **Margaret Dobson Further Education Trust** - people with a learning disability after they reach normal school leaving age, to learn skills to help them live more independent lives.
41. **Marjorie Viggers Charitable Trust** - charitable UK organisations; disability; medical care, relief and welfare; medical research; care, relief or protection of animals.
42. **Mobility Trust** - powered wheelchairs and mobility scooters for severely disabled children and adults who cannot obtain them through statutory sources or purchase such equipment themselves.
43. **Newlife Foundation for Disabled Children** - specialist equipment and nursing for children with complex and life limiting conditions.
44. **Oliver Ford Foundation** – UK charitable organisations supporting and educating people with learning disabilities.
45. **One Family Foundation** - customers can nominate projects.
46. **Percy Bilton Charity** - UK registered charities; disadvantaged/underprivileged young people (persons under 25); people with disabilities (physical or learning disabilities or mental health problems); older people (aged over 60).

47. [Peter Harrison Foundation](#) - UK registered charities running sports projects for people who are disabled or otherwise disadvantaged to fulfil their potential and develop personal and life skills.
48. [Queen Mary's Roehampton Trust](#) - UK registered charities for war disabled ex-Service men and women and their dependants.
49. [Shanly Foundation](#) - causes including the young, the elderly, those with a physical handicap, mental illness, injury or life limiting illness. Berkshire, Bucks, Hamps, Herts, N London, Oxon, and W Sussex.

60. [The G D Charitable Trust](#) - registered charities undertaking projects in animal welfare, the environment, disability and homelessness in England and Wales.
61. [The Florence Nightingale Aid in Sickness Trust](#) - people who are ill, convalescent or disabled to provide medical, disability and household aids that enable people to manage at home and live as independently as possible.
62. [The Hargreaves Foundation](#) - to help the disabled and underprivileged lead a full life through engagement in education, sport and associated activities, with an initial focus on those under 18.
63. [The Richard Overall Trust](#) - to advance the physical education of disabled young people so that they can enjoy and progress in their chosen sport.
